## Pathway Guide - MMF1P1

Making sense of course codes – Every subject is identified by a common course code designated by the Ministry of Education. The code consists of 5 mandated characters and a 6<sup>th</sup> character for school use.

The first 3 characters identify the subject. The 1<sup>st</sup> letter identifies the department.

A = Arts B = Business C = Canadian & World E = English

**Studies** 

F = French G = Guidance
H = Humanities & Social L = International
Sciences Languages

M = Mathematics P = Physical Educatioon

S = Science T = Technology

The school-specific 6<sup>th</sup> character is used to distinguish course characteristics and specialized programs. e.g.

I = Regular Course | Credit
D = Double Cooperative Education
M = Male
F = Female

The 4<sup>th</sup> character identifies:

1 = Grade 9 2 = Grade 10 3 = Grade 11 4 = Grade 12

The 5<sup>th</sup> character identifies the course

C = College M = University/College

D = Academic O = Open
E = Workplace P = Applied
L = Locally U = University

APPLIED (P)	<ul> <li>focus on the essential concepts with an emphasis on practical applications</li> <li>theoretical applications when appropriate e.g. ENG2P = Grade 10 Applied English</li> </ul>	COLLEGE PREPARATION (C)	<ul> <li>emphasize concrete applications of theoretical aspects</li> <li>equip students to meet the entrance requirements of college programs e.g. ENG4C = Grade 12 College English</li> </ul>
ACADEMIC (D)	<ul> <li>focus on the essential concepts with an emphasis on theoretical, abstract applications</li> <li>practical applications when appropriate e.g. ENG1D = Grade 9 Academic English</li> </ul>	UNIVERSITY PREPARATION (U)	<ul> <li>emphasize theoretical aspects of the course but include concrete applications</li> <li>equip students to meet the entrance requirements of university programs</li> <li>e.g. ENG3U = Grade 11 University English</li> </ul>
OPEN (O)	<ul> <li>suitable for all students at a given grade level</li> <li>designed to provide a broad range of education</li> <li>not designed with workplace, college or university destination requirements in mind</li> <li>may relate to career goals or student interests</li> <li>some Open level courses are offered in grades 11 and 12         <ul> <li>e.g. GLC2O = Grade 10 Open Career Studies</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	UNIVERSITY/COLLEGE PREPARATION (M)	<ul> <li>include content relevant to university and college programs</li> <li>emphasize theory and concrete applications         <ul> <li>e.g. MCF3M = Grade 11</li> <li>University/College Mathematics</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
LOCALLY DEVELOPED (L)	focus on the knowledge and skills to prepare for success in Workplace Preparation courses     e.g. ENG1L = Grade 9 Locally Developed English	WORKPLACE PREPARATION (E)	equip students with the knowledge and skills for direct entry into the workplace or for admission to apprenticeship and some other training programs e.g. ENG3E = Grade 11 Workplace English

Note: Academic and applied courses differ in the balance between essential concepts and additional material, and in the balance between theory and application. Academic courses contain more theory an additional materials.
