Superintendent Nelson presented updates on the new school build projects. At the secondary school in Brantford, construction has begun. The total cost of the project was discussed, which includes the land purchase and contingency fund. The tender for construction has been awarded and when the design plans have been finalized, they will be shared with the Trustees. Discussion was had surrounding the role that Trustees play in a new school being built. Trustees are involved in the tendering process to fulfill their fiduciary duties, but not the design phase as it falls under operations. There are no new updates regarding the two new elementary schools.

6.2 Attendance Boundary Review Updates

Director McDonald presented updates regarding the attendance boundary reviews. He noted that this is a busy year as three boundary reviews are taking place simultaneously (City of Brantford elementary, Brant County elementary and Brant/Brantford secondary). The first three committee meetings are complete for all three boundary reviews. The committees consist of parent representatives from the schools impacted. The public meeting for the City of Brantford is Monday December 1, 2025, and various options will be presented. The messaging continues to be that this is still very early in the process. The public meeting for the Brantford/ Brant County secondary school boundary review and the Brant County elementary school boundary review will take place in the new year. Discussion regarding the information that is shared at the public meetings was had. Before the public meeting, the committee's final task is to decide which options will be presented to the public. It was noted that the final recommendation that comes to the senior team prior to going to the board of trustees is made by the committee—not by staff or external planners. Discussion regarding the selection process for school representatives was had.

7. Community Agency Updates

Shannon Korber

Child and Family Services updated that Child and Family Services hosted *Rock a Moc* this month, with eleven students in care attending three sessions to make their own moccasins. The Teen Christmas Dinner is scheduled for December 4, 2025. The new Child and Family Services building will open this week, with a Grand Opening on November 28, 2025, at 221 Henry Street. She expressed gratitude to St. Michael's and St. Stephen's Schools for the collaboration and helping a family with transportation and school transition. Stability funding has also been provided to support the family's smooth transition.

Lauren Moulton

Woodview Mental Health and Autism Services updated that the Client Christmas party is on December 4, 205, by invitation-only. Woodview will be at Lynden Park Mall for Christmas wrapping and are looking for volunteers. A flyer will be shared with schools.

Jennifer Rudyk and Kerri Lomax

Principals reported that parent interviews were recently held across the schools, providing an important opportunity to strengthen family connections and introduce new families to the school community. They noted this is a busy and exciting season, with students engaged in programs such as Lexia, Key Math, and Empower, and Grade 4 students having completed CogAT testing. Classrooms are preparing for Christmas concerts, community outreach initiatives including giving trees and food drives, and Student Achievement Plans have been shared with teams and staff.

Melanie Caldwell

Contact Brant updated that the complex special needs pathway has been released, along with the new Service Coordination Plan. They noted the coming months will be busy as staff and partners work through these documents.

Mischa Dinsmore

Lansdowne Children's Services updated they have many upcoming events happening in December. All these opportunities are posted on the Lansdowne Children's Services website.

Michelle Drake

Crossing All Bridges updated that they previously hosted a weekly Monday night dance for everyone but have now partnered with Friendship with Kindness to offer the mixer exclusively on Friday nights. Flyers will be distributed soon.

Patti Mitchell

Patti Mitchell reported that informal correspondence from families through Special Olympics indicated that parents were very pleased with the transition into high school visits and the Open House, which provided valuable support and information. They expressed appreciation for these efforts. The Provincial Games were also highlighted as a great success, with families grateful for the volunteers provided by the BNHCDSB.

8. Student Achievement Lead and Superintendent of Education

The Special Education Department updated:

 Students in the Gifted Program attended Anne of Green Gables at the Stratford Festival and participated in a guided tour and workshop at the Stratford Perth Museum. Department support was provided on-site.

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- A two-day AI training session explored how AI can support curriculum adaptation for diverse learners, including early development of a Brightspace framework for AI supported instructional practices.
- Secondary department heads, Speech-Language Pathologists (SLPs), consultants, Spectrum Abilities Program, Community Living staff, and Peer Assisted Living teachers completed two Readtopia training sessions to strengthen programming for students with complex needs.
- Several system Identification, Placement and Review Committees were held in late October to welcome new out-of-board students into secondary special education classes.
- A virtual Community of Practice meeting was held for resource teachers.
- New Special Education Resource Teacher's completed their fourth training session on key
 mathematics concepts. All consultants and SLPs attended the Special Education Regional
 Collaborative Committee (SERCC) Conference in November, where the SLP team presented
 their Story Champs work. SERCC has since been cancelled for the rest of the year.
- Non-Violent Crisis Intervention training was provided to casual Educational Assistants and newly hired Child and Youth Workers.
- CAT4 testing for all Grade 4 students is complete. District results are being collected and reviewed to support gifted identification and determine additional student needs.
- Meetings with school teams continue regarding modified day schedules for younger students, ensuring accommodations are appropriate and supporting return to full-time attendance.
- A presentation was delivered to the Regional Catholic Parent Involvement Committee and parents outlining guiding principles, department structure, pathways for families to access support, available services, and student-centered decision-making.
- The Educational Assistant Training & Induction Program (ETIP) launched to support newly hired EAs in their first year of permanent employment. The program offers orientation, mentoring, and targeted professional learning. ETIP Mentor EAs are being recruited, with release time provided to support meaningful collaboration.

EQAO 2024-2025 UPDATE

Public Session

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The purpose of this report is to provide the Board of Trustees with an update on Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board (BHNCDSB) achievement and growth trends as reflected in the 2024–25 EQAO assessments. EQAO results offer an important snapshot of system performance in relation to Ontario curriculum expectations and support the Board in monitoring progress toward strategic priorities in literacy, numeracy, and student achievement. The Board remains committed to using EQAO evidence alongside classroom assessment and local data to celebrate successes, identify areas requiring focused improvement, and guide system-level supports that advance our mission of "Excellence in Learning ~ Living in Christ."

DEVELOPMENTS:

Elementary EQAO Results: Board-Wide Growth

Here are the elementary EQAO results for 2024-25 for the Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board compared to the province:

Grade 3	Reading	Writing	Math
BHNCDSB	77	65	63
Province	74	65	64

Grade 6	Reading	Writing	Math
BHNCDSB	85	82	44
Province	86	85	51

BHNCDSB students demonstrated encouraging improvement in multiple elementary achievement areas in 2024-25:

Grade 3 (Primary):

• Reading: +5% increase in students meeting the provincial standard

· Writing: results remained stable

• Mathematics: +1% increase

Grade 6 (Junior):

Reading: +2% increaseWriting: +2% increase

• Mathematics: +3% increase

These gains reflect the daily commitment of students and staff, supported by strong partnerships with families, and align with Board improvement strategies emphasizing structured literacy and targeted numeracy instruction.

School-Level Trends Across the System

Alongside overall Board gains, multiple schools demonstrated stable or improving performance:


- Nine (9) elementary schools stayed the same or improved across Grade 3 reading, writing, and mathematics.
- Twelve (12) elementary schools stayed the same or improved across Grade 6 reading, writing, and mathematics.
- Four (4) elementary schools stayed the same or improved across all Grade 3 and Grade 6 measures (reading, writing, mathematics):
 - o St. Leo Catholic Elementary School
 - o Blessed Sacrament Elementary School
 - o Madonna Della Libera Catholic Elementary School
 - Holy Cross School


These results indicate system-wide consistency of growth, particularly in foundational literacy and junior mathematics.

Three-Year EQAO Trends and Comparison to the Province (2023–2025)








Across the three-year period, results indicate stable-to-improving performance in elementary literacy and mathematics, with several areas tracking similarly to, or exceeding, provincial patterns. Sustained gains support continued implementation of structured literacy, responsive assessment, and classroom-embedded numeracy interventions.

Spotlight on Growth: Holy Cross School

Holy Cross School demonstrated especially strong improvement across both divisions:

Grade 3:

Reading: +15%Mathematics: +27%

Grade 6:

Reading: +28%Writing: +23%Mathematics: +26%

The school's improvement reflects a coordinated multi-year focus on:

- Reducing unnecessary program modifications in math and language to increase access to grade-level learning.
- Strengthening Universal Design for Learning (UDL), differentiated instruction (DI), and effective accommodations.
- Expanding evidence-based interventions (e.g., Lexia, Empower), and

Increasing staffing supports for diverse learner needs.



Three-Year EQAO Trends and Comparison to the Province (2023–2025)

To complement the current-year gains highlighted above, the Board reviews achievement patterns over time to determine whether improvement is sustained and aligned with provincial performance. EQAO Board results over the most recent three assessment cycles (2023–2025), alongside Provincial averages, were examined to identify trends, areas of growth, and continued needs.

Grade 9 Mathematics

Consistent with provincial trends, these results underscore the continued need to intensify Grades 9 mathematics instruction, learning, and transition supports, and to strengthen ongoing monitoring of achievement in Grade 9 mathematics classrooms. Early identification of students requiring additional assistance will enable timely, targeted intervention and help ensure supports are in place before achievement gaps widen.



OSSLT (Secondary Literacy)

Over the three-year period, BHNCDSB OSSLT achievement remained largely stable between 2022–23 and 2023–24 (85.0% to 84.1%, a 0.9 percentage-point decrease), followed by a strong increase in 2024–25 to 89.1% (+5.0 percentage points). Overall, OSSLT success improved by 4.1 percentage points across the three-year window (85.0% to 89.1%). Board-wide OSSLT

achievement therefore increased by approximately +5% in the most recent year, with gains across all secondary schools. This positive momentum reflects coherent literacy instruction, concentrated interventions, and strengthened classroom practices that support reading and writing across the curriculum and reinforces the continued emphasis on tiered supports and cross-curricular approaches to literacy.



At the secondary level, three-year trends demonstrate positive momentum in OSSLT achievement, while results in Grade 9 Mathematics reinforce the importance of intensified Grade 7–9 pathway supports, including targeted consultation, tiered interventions, and professional learning.

System Actions to Support Achievement Growth

In response to emerging achievement needs and prior to EQAO release, BHNCDSB strengthened system supports in 2025 through purposeful restructuring and staffing investments:

Elementary Supports

- Restructured Student Achievement Team to sharpen focus on EQAO Grade 3 and Grade 6 performance.
- Added seven Elementary Literacy and Numeracy Consultants to priority schools, emphasizing primary literacy and Grade 6 mathematics.

Secondary Supports

- Assigned a De-streamed Mathematics Consultant to each secondary school to support Grade 9 achievement through tiered intervention, close monitoring of student progress, and focused professional learning.
- Secondary Literacy Support has been strategically focused on Holy Trinity Catholic High School, as OSSLT achievement at Holy Trinity has historically been the lowest in the district. A dedicated Secondary Literacy Consultant is working alongside classroom teachers to implement tiered literacy supports and high-impact instructional practices that accelerate student success. This work includes coaching on evidence-based strategies within classroom instruction and strengthening crosscurricular approaches to literacy, ensuring that reading and writing skills are reinforced across all subject areas.

Collectively, these system-level staffing and supports strengthen instructional practice, reinforce tiered intervention structures, and enhance the Board's capacity to respond to identified achievement needs across panels. This sustained focus on evidence-informed improvement advances student learning and well-being and aligns directly with the strategic commitments of the BHNCDSB Multi-Year Strategic Plan, as outlined in the following section.

Alignment with the Strategic Plan

EQAO results reflect progress in relation to BHNCDSB's 2023–27 Strategic Plan priorities:

- Belonging for All: safe, inclusive, equitable, and welcoming environments where students are known, valued, and supported.
- Teaching & Learning for All: innovative, evidence-based learning experiences that strengthen literacy, numeracy, and life-long learning skills.
- Wellness for All: faith-filled communities that support the whole child and help students live their best life.

Growth in elementary literacy and numeracy, alongside improved OSSLT outcomes, demonstrates continued movement toward these priorities, while reinforcing the need for ongoing focus on Grade 9 mathematics.

Next Steps

Building on this year's results, BHNCDSB will continue to:

- Strengthen early and junior literacy supports that are showing positive impact.
- Deepen evidence-based mathematics instruction and intervention from K–6 and through the Grade 7–9 pathway.
- Closely monitor individual student achievement in mathematics and literacy.
- Invest in professional learning focused on classroom practice, student engagement, and achievement.
- Support student confidence, well-being, and identity through inclusive and faith-filled learning communities.

Progress will be monitored through ongoing classroom assessment evidence, school improvement planning, and future EQAO cycles, ensuring resources and supports remain responsive to student needs.
