Important resources and information for the 2026-27 school year

Paper report cards

Parents will have clear and reliable access to information about how their child is doing, with school boards once again required to provide families with paper report cards. Parents and guardians of students from Kindergarten to Grade 8 will receive a paper copy of their child's report card for the January/February and June reporting periods.

More funding for classroom supplies

For years, teachers have spent their own money, and parents have been asked to pitch in, to help purchase materials for classrooms. Starting this September, every eligible elementary teacher will have direct access to \$750 for classroom supplies. The Classroom Supplies Fund complements existing base funding schools receive for classroom and school supplies.

Welcome to Kindergarten!

Starting this September, students in kindergarten will learn based on [the new Ontario Kindergarten curriculum](#) focused on developing foundational skills in literacy, math and science and technology. Grading and assessment

Students in Grades 9 to 12 will be required to complete mandatory written exams and their weighting will be consistent across the province. Attendance and participation in the classroom will also count toward final marks. Excused absences, including for recreational, competitive, and school sports, as well as family vacations, are still permitted. The administrative process to have your child's absence excused is the same as it was last year. Financial literacy requirement

Beginning this fall, students must complete a financial literacy graduation requirement as part of the Grade 10 Career Studies course to earn their high school diploma. More information can be found at [Financial literacy education in schools | ontario.ca](#).

Supporting safe and positive school environments

Starting in September, school boards and local police services will be working together to implement School Resource Officer (SRO) programs in many Ontario communities. These programs help strengthen partnerships between police, schools and community partners to ensure all students feel safe, supported and can focus on learning.

Vision screening

Clear vision is important to success in the classroom. It is recommended that all children have a comprehensive eye exam before entering school and every year afterwards.
